heyna? The beloved Christian hymn "Amazing Grace" was written by the English poet and Anglican clergyman John Newton

to accompany a sermon he preached on New Year's Day in 1773. Without question, over the past 250 years, it's become an immensely popular hymn, especially in the United States, where we use it not only for religious occasions but for secular purposes as well. The text for the hymn is drawn from and inspired by an Old Testament passage from 1 Chronicles 17:16-17, in which King David responds to the prophet Nathan's comforting words that God intends to continue David's royal line beyond the present for all eternity. This passage reads:

Then King David went in and sat before the Lord and said, "<u>Who am</u> <u>I</u>, O Lord God, and what is <u>my</u> house, that you have brought me thus far? And even this was a small thing in your sight, O God; [for] you have <u>also</u> spoken of your servant's house <u>into the distant future</u>. <u>You</u> regard me [undeservedly] as someone of high rank, O Lord God."

The hymn's background is autobiographical as Newton wrote the words for "Amazing Grace" from his own personal experience. In 1748 while Newton served as a sea captain of a ship in the Atlantic slave trade, a violent storm off the coast of Ireland struck his vessel so severely that he called out to God for mercy. This moment marked Newton's turn toward God, which he

leaving sailing behind, Newton then began studying Christian theology and was ordained in the Church of England in 1764. He served as a minister in Olney, England where he began writing hymns.

While "Amazing Grace" was published in *Olney Hymns* in 1779, it was rarely sung in England. It was, however, in the United States that

the song became widely known during the early 1800's. Today "Amazing Grace" remains one of the most recognizable songs in the English-speaking world.

Take a moment now, to reflect on Newton's conversion, poetically rendered below:

Amazing grace how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me I once was lost, but now I'm found Was blind but now I see.

> 'Twas grace that taught my heart to fear And grace my fears relieved How precious did that grace appear The hour I first believed.

Through many dangers, toils, and snares I have already come This grace that brought me safe thus far And grace will lead me home.

> When we've been here ten thousand years Bright, shining as the sun We've no less days to sing God's praise Than when we first begun.

Amazing grace how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me I once was lost, but now I'm found Was blind but now I see.

The grace of which Newton writes here is understood in Christian theology to be God's help, God's favor upon you, God's blessing in any way and in many ways in your life; and all of it

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unearned and undeserved, though freely given and divinely bestowed, including your salvation through faith in Jesus Christ.

It's important for you to know that as a part of the infamous slave trade, Newton would have taken goods from England to West Africa to trade for African men, women and children, who were then shipped in barbaric conditions to the West Indies, where they were sold to plantation owners.

But God's call was strong, and eventually, after the events described above, he served as vicar in Olney where he wrote his famous hymn 250 years ago on New Year's Day. Filled with disgust for his former life as a slave trader, Newton went on to become a leading Abolitionist, giving firsthand evidence of the evil of that trade and helped to get it outlawed.

The hymn is perfect for the new year, as it looks back to the past and forward to the future, always trusting in God's loving kindness, which reaches out to you in love. That Amazing Grace, lived out in Jesus, still has the power to save any and all, even those such as a self-described 'wretch' as John Newton himself.

May that amazing love, indeed, the grace of God's loving kindness, be with you all, and surround your steps as you journey on into 2023.

Wreaths Across America

On Saturday, Dec 17th at noon, St. Stanislaus parishioners and friends participated in Wreaths Across America with more than 2,700 participating locations across the country.



Don Blackledge welcomed everyone and opened the ceremony with a moment of silence to remember the fallen, prisoners of war, those missing in action and honor those who have served this great nation. Bishop Nowicki then offered his blessings and remarks.

Following Bishop, Maria Hughes introduced

Judge Thomas Munley of Lackawanna County and Host of Eyewitness News Veterans Views. Judge Munley was glad to be a part of our ceremony in honoring the veterans and hoped to be invited back every year for this important event.

Our chairperson, Fred

Aebli, then spoke and in his remarks quoted our 40th President Ronald Regan. "Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction.



We didn't pass it to our children in the bloodstream. It must be fought for, protected, and handed on to them to do the same, or one day we will spend our sunset years telling our children and our children's children what it was once like in the United States where men were free."

Jack Partyka played Amaz-

ing Grace and ended with TAPS.

Wreaths were placed near the statue of Christ Benign, in memory of those who served and are serving in the United States Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Space Force, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines with the last wreath in honor of the 93,129

Servicemen from all branches whose last known status was either Prisoners of War or Missing in Action.



All those who participated were asked to then take a wreath to be placed at the grave site of our veterans and were encouraged to say their names out loud and say a prayer for them; a small act that goes a long way toward keeping the memory of our veterans alive. Wreaths were then placed all over the cemetery including the grave of Michael Sevensky who served in Merrill's Marauders in WW II.
