Wildflowers, herbs, grasses and the Solemnity of the Assumption/Dormition of Mary, August 15th – In Poland, Aug. 15 is called *Matki Boskiej Zielnej* – Blessed Mother (or Our Lady) of the Herbs. People traditionally gather herbs — not just plants like basil or mint, but all sorts of wildflowers and grain grasses — and bring them to the church for a blessing on Mary's feast.

The custom isn't just Polish but was common across Europe by the 10th century. (In Germany, the feast was sometimes called *Krautertag*.)

The blessed flowers and grains were then taken by farmers and scattered in fields and gardens, along with prayers for a good harvest next year. The blessed herbs were kept over the winter because it was believed they had both special healing powers and heightened quality as seasonings.

A traditional blessing reads, in part: "Almighty, everlasting God ... with mind and mouth we humbly implore you to bless with your clemency these herbs and fruits of various kinds, and to pour forth upon their natural power, already given by you, the grace of your new blessing; that ... they may provide protection against all disease and adversity."

In Eastern churches, the feast is known as the Dormition of the Holy *Theotokos* — (the falling asleep of the God-bearer.) In the Armenian Church, there is a blessing of grapes (*Khaglogh Orhnek*) on Aug. 15.

The grapes are harvested at this time of year and the church celebrates the blessing in memory, in part, of the offering of "first fruits" that dates to Old Testament times. As the Armenian Church in America's website explains: "Jesus Christ was the first born — or the first fruit — of Mary and, as such, was offered to God in the temple."

Countless flowers such as roses and lilies have been associated with Mary – both for her personal attributes and to commemorate her life story. These range from marigolds to Assumption lilies (hostas) and include the royal flower of France – the iris, or fleur-de-lis. So many flowers have been linked to the Virgin that gardens have been planted for her. First called "St. Mary Gardens," now just Mary Gardens, they trace to 15th century Scotland and England. These medieval gardens contained flowers and herbs, many of which are connected by legend to the infancy of Jesus, such as sage and lavender, which were bushes upon which Mary may have spread clothing after washing it on the flight to Egypt.

On Aug. 15, whether we bless herbs, grains, flowers or grapes, or just attend Mass in celebration, the sweetness of the feast and the harvest should remind us of Mary's own words: "The Almighty has done great things for me" (Lk 1:49). And God promises the same for us.
